Mr. Barwis is a justice of the peace for the county of Cumberland.

### Lineage.

The family was originally of Dearham, which estate they acquired at an early period, by marriage with the heiress. The senior line merged into the family of Lampugh. A branch settled at Ile Kirk, in Westward, became extinct the latter end of the 17th century, the co-heiresses marrying Fetherstonhaugh and Kirkley. Another branch is now represented by John Barwis, Esq. of Langrigg Hall. The father or grandfather of Thomas Barwis, who settled at Langrigg Hall, sold, it is said, a farm called Dryholm, within the parish of Holm Cultram, on which occasion the following verse was written:—

“Dryholm John was much to blame,  
To let th' estate go out o' th' name;  
More than five hundred years complete,  
Dryholm had been a Barwis seat.”

## BASKERVILLE OF CLYROW COURT.

BASKERVILLE - MYNORS, THOMAS - BASKERVILLE, Esq. of Clyrow Court, in Radnorshire, *b.* in 1790; *m.* 1st, in 1818, Anne, dau. and heiress of John Hancock, Esq. of Marlborough, but by her, who *d.* in 1832, had no issue, and 2ndly, 2 March, 1837, Elizabeth-Mary, dau. of the Rev. Powell-Colchester Guise, younger brother of the present Sir John-Wright Guise, Bart. of Highnam, and has issue,

WALTER-THOMAS, *b.* 7 Jan. 1839.

Herbert-Witherstone, *b.* in Sept. 1841.

Mr. Mynors-Baskerville, who is a magistrate for the counties of Hereford, Radnor, and Wilts, and deputy-lieutenant of the last shire, inherited the

Wiltshire estates in 1817, upon the decease of Col. Baskerville, and in the following year he assumed by sign-manual the surname and arms of that ancient and eminent family. He served the office of high-sheriff for Wilts, in 1827, and is now M.P. for Herefordshire.

### Lineage.

The family of BASKERVILLE is one of the most ancient and honourable in England, its name is upon the roll of Battel Abbey, it has ever maintained the highest rank amongst the gentry, and it can boast of the blood of the PLANTAGENETS.

The Baskervilles came into Herefordshire soon after the Conquest,\* and settling at Erdisley, became connected with the first families of the county, served the office of sheriff no less than twenty-one times, and were elected knights of the shire in eleven parliaments.

Their pedigree has been authentically deduced, and is duly registered in the College of Arms.

SIR ROBERT BASKERVILLE, Knt. of Erdisley Castle, in the co. of Hereford, *m.* Agnes, dau. and heiress of Nesta, dau. of Rees ap Griffith, Prince of South Wales, and was *s.* by his son,

SIR RALPH DE BASKERVILLE, Lord of Erdisley in the time of HENRY II., who *m.* a dau. of Drogo, brother of Richard Lord Clifford, and was *s.* by his son,

SIR ROGER DE BASKERVILLE, of Erdisley, living in the reign of HENRY II., who espoused a dau. of Sir Rothes de Gros, Knt. Lord of Orcop, and was *s.* by his son,

WALTER DE BASKERVILLE, of Erdisley, *temp.* RICHARD I., who was *s.* by his son,

WALTER DE BASKERVILLE, who *m.* Susan, dau. of Sir John Crigdon, Knt., and had three sons, WALTER, (Sir.) of Erdisley, *temp.* HENRY III., who left two daus. his co-heirs; RICHARD, (Sir.) of whom we are about to treat, and George, Lord of Lawton and Pickthorne. The second son of Walter de Baskerville,

SIR RICHARD DE BASKERVILLE, M.P. for the co. of Hereford in 1295 and 1297, became Lord of Erdisley at the decease of his elder brother, He *m.* a dau. of Sir Sollers, Knt., and was *s.* by his elder son,

SIR WALTER DE BASKERVILLE, Lord of Combe, who *m.* in the 26th EDWARD I., Sibill, dau. of Peter Corbet, of Caux, and dying about the 12th EDWARD II., was *s.* by his son,

SIR RICHARD DE BASKERVILLE, Knt. of Erdisley, M.P. for the co. of Hereford in 1347, who *m.* in the 14th EDWARD II., Jane, or Joane, dau. of Sir Richard Paines, or Poydings, Knt., and was *s.* by his son,

SIR RICHARD BASKERVILLE, Knt. of Erdisley, living *temp.* EDWARD III., who *m.* Isabella, dau. and heiress of Sir Walter Caveley, Knt., by whom he had a son, his successor,

SIR RICHARD BASKERVILLE, Knt., who *m.* Joan, dau. of Adam de Everingham, of Laxton, and dying 16 Sept. 1395, was *s.* by his son,

SIR JOHN BASKERVILLE, Knt., living in the reign of HENRY IV. This gentleman *m.* Elizabeth, dau. and heiress of John Brugge, of Letton and Stanton, and had issue,

JOHN (Sir), his successor.

Ralph, *b.* 21 Oct. 1410, who *m.* Anne, dau. and co-heiress of Sir John Blackett, Knt., and left an only dau. and heiress, JANE, *m.* to Simon Milbourne, of Tillingdon.

Sir John Baskerville was *s.* by his eldest son,

SIR JOHN BASKERVILLE, Knt. of Combe, *b.* 12 Feb. 1403. In Sir Harris Nicolas's History of the Battle of Agincourt, Sir John Baskerville is stated to have been in the retinue of HENRY V. He *m.* Elizabeth, dau. of John Touchet Lord Audley, and dying 23 Dec. 1455, was *s.* by his eldest son,

SIR JAMES BASKERVILLE, Knt. of Erdisley, M.P. for the co. of Hereford in 1476, and sheriff 38th HENRY VI., 4th EDWARD IV., and 14th HENRY VII. He was made

\* In the year 1109, forty-three years after the Conquest, HENRY I., on the marriage of his eldest dau., levied a territorial impost of 3s. for every hide of land, and returns were in consequence made by the Barons &c. of the co. of Hereford, in which Adam de Port returns the name of Radulphus de Baskerville, and Hugo de Lacy, that of Robertus de Baskerville.

a Knight-Banneret on the field, after the battle of Stoke, near Newark, in 1487, and a Knight of the Bath at the coronation of HENRY VII. He *m.* Katherine, dau. of Walter Devereux, Lord Ferrers of Chartley, lineally descended from King EDWARD I., and had,

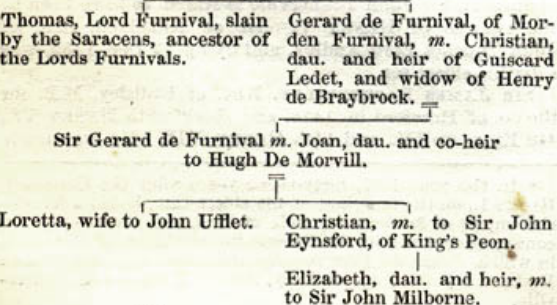

Middlesex, Esq. (by Rose, his wife, dau. and heir of Henry Neale, of London, Esq., lineally descended from the ancient house of NEALE,\* of Dean, in Bedfordshire,) and has issue,

I. Emma.

This gentleman, to evince his respect for the memory of his ancestor, Sir John Kyrle, of Much Marcle, Bart., (whose estates devolved upon him on the demise of his brother, Major-Gen. Sir James Kyrle Money, Bart.,) assumed by Royal licence, dated 10 Aug. 1843, the surname of KYRLE, in addition to and after that of MONEY, together with the arms of KYRLE, to be borne quarterly with those of his own family.

### Lineage.

In the oldest writings relative to the KYRLES, the name is variously written, *Crul*, *Crull*, and *Crulle*; afterwards *Cryll*, and sometimes *Curl*; until at last it was universally spelt KYRLE. The first of the family on record,

ROBERT CRUL, of Altone, or Old Town, near Ross, resided, in 1295, at Homme, now Hom Green, in the same neighbourhood. From him descended WALTER KYRLE, who was seated at "the Hulle," or Hill, near Ross, in the year 1489. Dying at the close of the same century, this gentleman bequeathed the Hill to his eldest son, WALTER, who left an only dau. and heir, Alice, *m.* to Christopher Clarke, Esq.,\* and to his second son, JAMES, the estate of Walford, near Ross. JAMES thus became founder of the WALFORD branch of the KYRLE family. He was grandfather to the founder of the MUCH MARCLE branch. Of this latter, which although the younger, was the most distinguished line of the family, we are about more particularly to treat.

THOMAS KYRLE, of Walford Court, son and heir of the above-mentioned James, lived *temp.* HENRY VII., and by his marriage with Johan, dau. and heir of Hugh Abraham, (by Alice, his wife, dau. of John Rudhall, of Rudhall,) had, with four daus., nine sons. Stafford, Esq., who, according to a pedigree in the office of Ulster king-of-arms, in Dublin, attested by Segar, Garter king-of-arms, was lineally descended from FRANCIS, VISCOUNT LOVEL; his lordship's second son having assumed the name of Vincent after his father's death at the battle of Stoke, A.D. 1487.

† This family derives its name from the village of Earnley, or Ernle, in Sussex, so styled from the Saxon words "Earn" and "Lege,"—"The place or habitation of eagles;" in reference to which three eagles were borne as the arms of Ernle. In the reign of HENRY III., Richard de Earnley was seated at Earnley. His son represented the shire in parliament, A.D. 1331, and from him, the 13th in regular descent, was Sir John Ernle, of Bury Town, who *m.* Vincentia Kyrle. The Ernles continued to reside at Ernle, maintaining a leading position in the county, till the commencement of the sixteenth century, when, acquiring by marriage extensive estates in Wiltshire, they gradually withdrew from Sussex, and the elder line in that county terminating in a female, the male representation reverted to the branch which, in the reign of ELIZABETH, (in virtue of the marriage of Michael Ernle, Esq., with Mary, dau. and heir of Roger Finamore, of that manor,) enjoyed possession of Whetham, in Wilts, and is now represented by the REV. WILLIAM MONEY KYRLE. The Ernles were ever distinguished for their loyalty, particularly during the Great Rebellion. Sir Michael Earnley, the Governor of Shrewsbury Castle, (who was born at Whetham,) was, as Clarendon relates, "killed in his shirt," at the capture of Shrewsbury, "whilst he behaved himself as well as was possible, and refused quarter." The name of Sir John Ernle, of Whetham, occurs in the list of those who, at the Restoration, were to have been invested with the order of the Royal Oak; the Ernles of Etchilhampton were compelled to compound for their estates as "malignants;" and on the 2nd Feb. 1660-1, a Baronetcy was granted to that branch of the family, which expired with Sir Edward Ernle, of Brimslade, on the 26th Dec. 1787.

‡ This family, whose pedigree is fully given in the Visitations of Worcestershire, was of knightly degree previous to the reign of EDWARD III., and in point of descent ranked with the most ancient houses of the kingdom. It derived its name from the hamlet of Washbourne, or Wasseborne, in Worcestershire, where at the earliest period of its history we find it located. The Washbournes flourished here till the commencement of the fifteenth century, when John Washbourne, (great-grandson of Sir Roger Washbourne, of Washbourne,) marrying the heiress of John Poher, of Wychenford, in Worcestershire, his son, Norman Washbourne, retired to his mother's estate, at Wychenford, where his descendants continued to reside for many generations. During the troubles in the reign of CHARLES I., the Washbournes suffered severely for their loyalty. Among the cavaliers taken prisoners at the battle of Worcester, and afterwards obliged to compound with the parliament for their estates, the name of "John Washbourne, of Wychenford," the head of this family, appears—a gentleman who had already almost exhausted his estate in the service of the king. About this period the Washbournes removed to Pytchley, in Northamptonshire, having acquired by marriage property in that county. The male line terminated with Ernle Washbourne, Esq., (the eighteenth in lineal succession from Sir Roger Washbourne, *temp.* HENRY III.) who *d. s. p.* 4 Sept. 1743, aged 53. He was son of William Washbourne, Esq. of Wychenford, and Pytchley, who, as shewn above, *m.* Hester, dau. of Sir John Ernle, of Bury Town, and whose only child that left issue, was *m.* to Francis Money, Esq., great-grandfather of the present REV. WILLIAM MONEY KYRLE.

\* This family derived its name from STOCHE, or STOK, in Surrey, and TUN, a word signifying "enclosure." At the period of the CONQUEST, Godwin de Stockton resided at Stockton, and in the 3rd EDWARD III., Henry de Stockton had royal licence to empark there certain acres of land. In the early part of the 16th century, the family became divided into two branches; the elder division continued at Stoughton, and obtained a Baronetcy, 29 Jan. 1660-1, which, in 1691-2, became extinct on the death of Sir Lawrence Stoughton, of Stoughton. The second branch seating itself at St. John's, Warwick, a large and ancient mansion, originally the hospital of St. John the Baptist, remained there in direct descent for a long series of years, until the male line expired with George Stoughton, who left the dau. and co-heir, Eugenia, who married Lieut.-Col. ROBERT-BASKERVILLE RICKARDS, of Christ Church, Oxford, and of the Inner Temple, *b.* in 1819.

Edmund-Baskerville, *b.* in 1823.

Walter-Baskerville, *b.* in 1826.

Thomas-Baskerville, *b.* in 1834.

Mr. Mynors *s.* his father in 1794, and served the office of high-sheriff for the co. Radnor in 1825.

He is a deputy-lieutenant and magistrate for Herefordshire and Radnorshire.

## Lineage.

In the roll of Battel Abbey, the name of MYNORS, the founder of this family, appears as one of the esquires attendant upon the CONQUEROR, and TREAGO has been in their possession since the Conquest.

ROGER MINERS, of Treago, who *m.* Margaret, dau. and heiress of John de la Hay, of Wellington, and was *s.* by his son,

PHILIP MINERS, of Treago, who *m.* Alice, dau. of William ap Jenkin ap Ierworth, and was *s.* by his son,

PAGANUS MINERS, of Treago, who *m.* a dau. of John a Brett, and was *s.* by his son,

JENKIN MINERS, who *m.* Eva, dau. of Philip Michell, and left a son and successor,

RICHARD MINERS, who was sheriff of Herefordshire in 16 HENRY VII. (anno 1500.) He *m.* Joan, dau. of Gwylim, ap Thomas, ap Llewellyn, ap Howell, ap Gylough, and had issue,

ROGER, (Sir,) who *m.* Alice, dau. of Sir William Myll, Knt., of Gloucester, and *d. s. p.* Sir Roger was knighted by HENRY VIII., and with his lady was buried, in 1536, at Duffield, near Derby, where there is a beautiful monument to their memory.

ROGER MYNORS, Esq. of Treago, who *m.* Jane, dau. of John Harley, Esq. of Brampton-Brian, and aunt of Sir Robert Harley,\* K.B., Master of the Mint, *temp.* CHAS. I., and was *s.* at his decease by his son,

ROWLAND MYNORS, Esq. of Treago, who *m.* Theodosia, dau. of Sir Percival Willoughby, Knt. of Wollaton, in Nottinghamshire,† and dying in 1651, was *s.* by his son,

ROBERT MYNORS, Esq. of Treago, *b.* in 1616, who *m.* in 1649, Eliza, dau. of James Oswald, Esq. of St. Weonard's, and had issue,

ROBERT, his successor.

Theodosia, who *m.* first, Roger Boulcot, Esq. of Hereford, and had an only dau. and heiress,

THEODOSIA BOULCOT, who *m.* to Peter Rickards, Esq. of Evenjobb, in Radnorshire, son of John Rickards, Esq., auditor of Wales to CHARLES I., and left a son, PETER RICKARDS, Esq. of Evenjobb, who *m.* in

\* This gentleman had a grant for life from the crown, 12th Sept., 1626, (1 CHARLES I.,) of the office and offices of master and worker of monies to be coined in the Tower of London; and, on 8 Nov. following, an indenture was made between the king and Sir Robert, for coining the monies of silver and gold, according to his letters patent. To this office was annexed a salary of four thousand pounds per annum. After the king's murder, the parliament having ordered a new coin to be stamped, Sir Robert Harley refused to coin with any other stamp than that of the king; whereupon the parliament ordered a trial of the pixe to be made at Sir Robert's expense, and removed him from his place. While he had enjoyed it, to the great improvement of our coin, he introduced the famous artist, Thomas Symonds, to be engraver of the dies for the mint.

EDWARD WITHERSTONE, sheriff of Herefordshire, 1720, who *m.* Anne Barrett, and left at his decease, an only daughter,

Catharine Witherstone, who *m.* as stated above, her kinsman, Peter Rickards.

Mr. Mynors *d.* 23 Aug. 1672, and was *s.* by his son,

ROBERT MYNORS, Esq. of Treago, *b.* in April, 1654, *m.* Eliza, dau. of William Adams, Esq. of Monmouth, and was *s.* by his son,

ROBERT MYNORS, Esq. of Treago, sheriff of Herefordshire in 1735, who *m.* Thomasine, dau. of Thomas Gouge, Esq. of London, and dying 10 June, 1742, was *s.* by his son,

ROBERT MYNORS, Esq. of Treago, who served the office of sheriff of the co. Hereford in 1758. He *m.* Mary, dau. and heiress of Thomas Parry, Esq. of Arkston, by whom (who *m.* 2ndly, Charles Morgan, Esq. of Ruperra, second son of Thomas Morgan, Esq. of Tredegar) he had no issue. He *d.* in 1765, when the estates and representation of the Mynors' family passed to his kinsman, (refer to descendant of Theodosia, dau. of Robert Mynors, 14th Lord of Treago.)

PETER RICKARDS, Esq. of Evenjobb, who assumed, in 1787, the additional surname of MYNORS. He *m.* Meliora, dau. and heiress of the Rev. John Powell, (by Philippa, dau. and heiress of Thomas Baskerville, Esq. of Aberedow, co. Radnor, by Meliora, dau. of Richard Baskerville, Esq. of Richardston, co. Wilts.) and had issue,

PETER RICKARDS-MYNORS, of Treago, present proprietor. Thomas-Baskerville Mynors, *b.* in 1790, assumed the additional surname of BASKERVILLE, in 1818, and served the office of sheriff for Wilts in 1827. (*See* family of BASKERVILLE OF CLYBOW COURT.)

Meliora, *m.* in 1815, to H.-H. Farmar, Esq. of Dunsinane, co. Wexford, and has issue.

Mr. Rickards-Mynors *d.* in 1794, and was *s.* by his eldest son, the present PETER RICKARDS-MYNORS, Esq. of TREAGO.

### Family of Baskerville.

The BASKERVILLES of Erdisley (the name of whose patriarch is to be found inscribed on the roll at Battel Abbey) were for many reigns champions to the kings of England, and were sheriffs of the co. Hereford twenty-one times. (For ample details of the Baskerville family, see p. 63.)

Camden, in his "Britannia," in the account of Herefordshire, observes: "Erdisley, where the famous and ancient family of BASKERVILLE have long inhabited, which bred in old time so many noble knights; they deduce their original from a niece of Gunora, that most celebrated Norman lady, who long ago flourished in this county and its neighbour, Shropshire; and held the hamlet of Lanton *in capite*, as of the honour of Montgomery, by the service of giving the king one barbed arrow as often as he came into those parts to hunt in Cornedon Chase."

SIR ROBERT BASKERVILLE, Knt. of Erdisley Castle, co. Hereford, *m.* Agnes, dau. and heir of Galfrid Rees, of Wales,\* and was *s.* by his son,

SIR RALPH BASKERVILLE, living *temp.* HENRY II., from whom we pass to his descendant,

SIR RICHARD BASKERVILLE, one of the knights of the shire for the co. Hereford, to whom, in 1300, the writ was issued for the observation of the charter of forests. He was sheriff of Herefordshire 8 EDWARD II. (*anno* 1315.) He *d.* in the reign of EDWARD III., leaving by his wife, Joanna, dau. of Sir Richard Poynes, or Poynings, a son and successor,

SIR RICHARD BASKERVILLE, of Erdisley, whose son,

SIR RICHARD BASKERVILLE, of Erdisley, was in ward to King RICHARD II., and attained majority in the seventeenth of that prince. He *d.* in 1395. His grandson,

SIR JOHN BASKERVILLE, Knt., *m.* Elizabeth, dau. of John Touchet, Lord Audley,† and was *s.* by his son,

SIR JAMES BASKERVILLE, who was sheriff of Hereford

SIR JAMES BASKERVILLE, Knt., who *m.* Elizabeth, dau. and co-heir of John Breynton, and had issue,

JAMES, (Sir,) who *m.* Katherine, dau. of Walter, Viscount Hereford, but does not appear to have had issue.

John, whose line ceased with his great-grandson, Humphrey Baskerville, in 1617.

Thomas, (Sir,) whose only dau. and heir, Eleanor, *m.* to John Talbot, Esq. of Grafton.

Walter, *d. s. p.* Humphrey.

Sir James *d.* 13 Nov. 1546, and as the line of the family eventually proceeded from his youngest son, we pass at once to that person,

HUMPHREY BASKERVILLE, who *m.* Eleanor, dau. and heir of John Aguilham, of Lambdr and Aberedow, both in the co. Radnor, and was *s.* by his son,

JOHN BASKERVILLE, whose great-grandson,

THOMAS BASKERVILLE, Esq., *m.* Sybella, dau. of Collins of Bryngwyn, and was *s.* by his son,

THOMAS BASKERVILLE, Esq., who *m.* Meliora, dau. of Richard Baskerville, Esq. of Winterbourne, and dying in Nov. 1740, left an only dau. and heiress,

PHILIPPA BASKERVILLE, who *m.* the Rev. John Powell, and left an only dau. and heiress,

MELIORA POWELL, who *m.* 1st, PETER RICKARDS-MYNORS, Esq. of Enjobb, co. Radnor, and was mother of the present PETER RICKARDS-MYNORS, Esq. She *m.* 2ndly, Jasper Farmar, Esq.
